The new Academy – which will make real difference to the lives of so many of our students, now and into the future – changed from vision to reality because of her considerable efforts. During an incredible 25 years of service for COT, Martyn has certainly left his mark in many ways, both on the buildings themselves and the folks who live and work within them. Care Services

... supporting our residents, tenants and students

With funding from the NIHR School for Social Care Research, they are exploring life skills training programmes through a range of discussions with service users, family members and service providers. They are seeking to find out who attends these programmes and to learn more about their experiences, the benefits, barriers and outcomes. Although a number of Canterbury Oast Trust parents kindly agreed to attend a Focus Group meeting for family members in June, there were not sufficient numbers to make the meeting viable. The researchers are hoping to reschedule the meeting later in the summer and I do hope that those who have not already signed up might consider getting involved. The project has the potential to be enormously useful in helping to make the case for continued funding for day services, so we are throwing all our support behind the researchers and their work. Those not able to attend a meeting in Canterbury can opt to have a one-to-one discussion in a location of their choice instead – there is lots of flexibility. If you are willing to take part, please let us know – I know the researchers would be very keen to hear your views.

Currently we are still awaiting reports from more recent inspections at Holly and Ivy Cottages. Old School House have also welcomed new resident Chris Keogh. Chris has been accessing our Life Skills services for quite some time and everyone was pleased to see that he was successful with his funding application for a residential placement and it is fantastic to see how quickly he has settled in to his new home.

I understand that it shouldn't be too long now until the Beaver Lodge extension is finished too. It will be exciting to see who will benefit from this prime opportunity for supported living placements with the Trust.

In terms of Life Skills services, there always seems to be so much going on. Poulton Wood Bluebell Cream Tea was a notable success, as was the woodlands open day. Art at the Farm installed their new exhibition over at the Beaney House of Art & Knowledge in Canterbury in May, and several services attended the Wealden Fair recently, so it is a veritable hive of industry out there.

The new Pathfinders course is now up and running, with the first ever cohort getting to grips with learning all about cultures and practices in the working world, how to identify skills and knowledge that would be useful to employers, how to prepare CV's and what they need to do to get ready for interviews. Juliet Perschky, the Work and Employment Coordinator, is certainly working hard to help our service users to get themselves ready for future employment or voluntary placements. Indeed one early success has been with the help and encouragement extended to Faye Price who was successfully mentored in applying for a flexi post at the Granary restaurant. Well done to Faye for achieving this tremendous milestone. With the first Pathfinders course now being about half way through, Juliet would love to hear from any service users who may be interested in joining the second cohort. We know some of you may think it is a little early in the day to be identifying new students for the next course, but the preparation, funding, and decision-making process can take a while, so it helps to set things in place well in advance.

Work & Employment



The Phoenix Rises!

After a hugely successful campaign—which began back in 2016— it is a great thrill to announce that we have finally reached the fundraising target for a much-needed new college building at Highlands Farm.

The Foley Centre, which will boast 4 flexible classrooms, a dedicated one-to-one study area and a specially designed interactive space, will be the home of our new and improved learning service—the *MY LIFE* Skills Academy.

Purpose-Built Facility

At 144 square meters, the new facility is *three times* the size of our existing college—a small temporary structure with only two tiny teaching areas and a single toilet cubicle.



The opportunity to develop the service in a purpose-built environment, far more suited to the needs of our students their tutors and our dedicated team of college volunteers, is an enormously exciting prospect. But we couldn't have done it without help.

A Leap of Faith

Over a coffee one wintry afternoon, I shared the Trust's hopes for a new learning centre with John Foley, brother of COT tenant Robert. I explained that the Trust had been aware of the need for the project for many years, but it was a daunting prospect, requiring significant investment and with no guarantee of planning permission on the Highlands Farm site.

Thankfully for Canterbury Oast Trust, John took a huge leap of faith that day and made the lead donation that began our fundraising journey. When the total project cost increased due to rapidly rising materials prices, John and his wife Dina made a second donation to ensure the building works could begin.

As we hoped, the concept of the Skills Academy certainly proved inspiring and we were soon bowled over by the enormous generosity of the people we approached. Every COT friend and supporter who took the time to vote can be proud of the part they played in our success.

Securing the highest donation ever awarded by the Cantiacorum Foundation (for charities in Kent and Medway) was also humbling, especially in light of the many very worthy causes they support across the county. Having played such a vital role in the 33-year history of COT, it was wonderful to receive a significant donation to the Academy from the dedicated volunteers at Hitrade. What better way for them to embark upon their second million-pound target?

The Civil Service Insurance Society Charity Fund made a grant to the project in the early stages of the campaign and invited COT to make a second request, if necessary, to help complete the project. They proved good to their word, and receiving a second cheque almost one year after the first was certainly a memorable event.

Every Pound Counts

As we know, however, a fundraising campaign is very much a group effort and so we are indebted to each and <u>every</u> donor for <u>every</u> pound they have gifted towards this incredibly important project. On behalf of the many service users who will benefit - now and into the future - we thank you; one and all.

There's Still Time to Get Involved!

With the building campaign complete, we are now turning our minds to the fit-out costs. To that end we are grateful to the Rotary Club of Sandwich and to Ken and Debbie Chappell (who are travelling far and wide with their Problematic Pop Quizzes) for the money they are raising towards equipment and specialist furniture.

We still have a remaining target of £25,000 to meet before the building opens in the autumn. It's all going on in Estates....

Beaver Lodge – Despite starting in January and having to work through all the cold and rain, the new extension has been completed and is now in use. The final part of the build, to convert the former lounge into a self-contained flat, has begun and we are looking to have this ready by 1st of June. When work is completed, Beaver will be able to become home for two more people.



Thanks to Hi Trade the mess hut extension is up, in use and giving everyone breathing space – but the work is not yet completed. Hi Trade has funded work to replace the old kitchen and fit a new larger one. The old storage heaters system, which at best has struggled, is due an update to proper central heating. It will take heat from the new college next door. If users remember to shut the door, it may even be warm in winter as Estates have also got plans to insulate the roof.

We are also replacing the balcony at Watchbell; the old one has been in place for centuries and was in need of repairs. It needed to be held up with scaffolding, while the Council's conservation department and building control fought it out; one wanted it put back exactly as it had always been and the other wanted it to meet modern standards in all respects.

When that was eventually sorted we then needed to get hold of craftsmen who have the skills to work on old buildings. There are not many who can work to the standard required and a 6 month wait was needed to get who we wanted. It was worth the wait and

In addition to all this the new general data protection regulations are coming into effect. If the Mariners is a building challenge then believe me, these new regulations are worse. We are working to ensure that the information we keep is fully compliant with this new set of rules. It is good as it protects us all but is proving very demanding. You will be receiving correspondence asking for your agreement to keep your name on a database, so In Touch and other publications and notices can come to you. When you get the request please respond if you agree. If we do not get your agreement we have to take you off the mailing or email list and will not be able to send you In Touch amongst other things.

This is where I really must retract any rude comments about Adam – he has been a Godsend in many areas of the business, but in particular with researching the technology that will allow COT to comply.

The Board of Trustees is preparing for the departure of some familiar faces later this year. Each COT Trustee may serve a maximum of three terms of three years (although, to ensure continuity of knowledge, it was agreed that Trustees who were serving at the date of the 2013 AGM - when this limit was introduced - would be eligible to serve for one further term of three years if they had already served for over nine years). For that reason, Elizabeth Emson (former Chair) and Peter Ergis (Company Secretary) will be stepping down from their Trustee roles at the AGM in October. Although we will express our formal thanks for their efforts nearer the time, we are already thinking about how to fill the significant holes they will leave.

We have also identified some other key areas that we would like to address and are therefore currently seeking new Trustees who may be suitable for the Company Secretary role, or those with skills and experience in Finance, Tourism and Care. In particular for Care specialists, a knowledge of local authority commissioning would be especially valuable.
