When the resignation of the Prime Minister is the THIRD item on the 10 O'clock News, you know you are living in strange times.

So much has happened since I wrote my last piece for In Touch and I now find myself eager to see what will actually change as a result.

Certainly, under the previous government's austerity measures, the Care sector faced

some significant challenges. Provision for adult social care was reduced by an eye-watering £500m in 2015, with the Local Government Association estimating a funding gap of £4.3bn by the end of the decade.

The previous Chancellor's introduction of a compulsory National Living Wage is also beginning to have serious implications for care providers, many of whom have an average wage bill amounting to over 60% of their total costs. Whilst we all welcome the recognition of essential front-line staff, this is only feasible when we can recover the true cost of the services we provide. The squeeze on local authority funding means that - far from increasing in line with these costs - care fees are often staying the same (or barely increasing) year on year. As you would hope, COT is working hard to ensure our strategy keeps us ahead of these challenges, but for many in the sector, the waters are feeling very choppy. News of calmer times ahead would be most welcome for us all.

In a speech launching her national campaign to become Leader of the Conservative Party, our new Prime Minister set out her vision for a Britain, "that works for everyone – whoever you are and wherever you're from." It's good to hear, but we obviously need to know much more about the detail before we can take comfort from the sentiment.

It's Tiddley Snooker!

A fun game to develop numeracy skills based on the Game of Snooker. This game was developed at Harrington College by Tutor John Cunningham with the assistance of students Symon Young and Nick Sanderson who were both attending John's intermediate skills sessions at the time.

The aim of the game is to score with coloured counters in the same way that snooker is scored. For example red equals one point, black equals seven points. Two dice with coloured spots on them instead of numbers are thrown, one dice with equal red and white spots for a red



'pot' (white is a missed pot and the next player or team takes their turn) and the other dice covers the yellow, green, brown, blue, pink and black sequence. A Tiddley winks version of snooker can also be played. The name 'Tiddley Snooker' was christened when Charles Underhill visited the college one afternoon and saw us developing and playing the game with all the coloured counters and dice. The rules of play are developing nicely as the game is being played both by the Harrington College students and John's grandchildren.
