

Plants and Produce

With a definite feeling of spring in the air we are very happy to say goodbye to a horribly wet winter. This is a great time of year for gardeners, full of hope, expectation and excitement for the coming season. The Plants and Produce team are busy planning and preparing for the summer. Seeds are being sown, seedlings carefully pricked out and our precious new plants are being nurtured as we get them through the next few weeks of unpredictable British weather. Every evening you'll see us tucking the tender plants in under fleece to protect them from low temperatures and frost damage.

We have also been researching new and exciting varieties of vegetables, fruit and flowers to grow ourselves and sell to our visitors both as produce and plants. After the success of our delicious and very nutritious black turtle beans we are giving chick peas a try this year. Gary has been busy running refresher courses, so, due to the high standard of seed sowing, we have an abundance of strong, healthy plants ready to plant in the poly tunnel once the soil has warmed a little. Sadly the peanut harvest was a little disappointing in the autumn as the crop was devastated when the mice got a taste for them. However we won't let a little thing like ravenous rodents stop us as they are a fascinating plant and everyone really enjoyed growing them.

We have also been busy over the winter further developing the raised bed site to make it more attractive, productive and user friendly. The path leading to the area has been planted with apple and pear trees which will be trained as espaliers, with the branches growing horizontally. This will enable the fruit to be picked by people with limited mobility and from a wheelchair thereby opening up new harvesting opportunities for many people.

Our tomato plants of various different shapes, sizes and colours are coming along delightfully, and along with our vegetable packs are available for sale now. Keep your eyes on the sales area by the shop; they don't hang around for very long! Herbs are springing back into life now too; it's a very good time to be planting so there will be a wide variety of these available as well.



We have started growing our summer bedding plants in the last few weeks and they are growing nicely. We will have a vibrant selection of summer bedding ready at the end of April - beginning of May. We will be offering our hanging basket planting service again this year too. The tunnels and glasshouse are all filled to bursting with all our baby plants. It is so lovely to be really busy again-the spring has sprung!



Poulton Wood

Well, it would seem that winter is finally over! The sun is shining (today at least) the birds are flirting and the bluebells are already showing bits of blue! The first bloom this year was recorded in the wood on 4th Feb and on the 17th we had a walk and counted 30! Looks like they're going to be early this year after a very mild and wet winter. Bluebells are site specific and can bloom anytime mid-April to mid-May and Poulton Wood always fell into the mid-April category. Then we had a few cold winters and they were getting later and later and well into May before they reached full bloom. This year however they are definitely slipping back into their old ways. Every year we spend a lot of time watching and waiting and wondering when. Mostly because we want to pitch our Bluebell Cream Tea as closely as possible to coincide with their peak of perfection, but it's always tricky.

The date we've set for this year is Saturday 23rd April which is St George's Day. Fantastic we all thought, let's make a meal of it! Well,

Julian is going to dress up as St George (and believe me he didn't take much persuading) and has got himself some very fitting knight in shining armour type attire, and everyone has been really busy helping him to make a giant willow dragon which, if I do say so myself, is very impressive indeed. We thought something along the lines of St George joining us on the guided walk - someone rushing out of Lambert's Marsh in a distressed state shouting 'HELP! HELP!', St George rushing to assist (with all the walkers following), coming upon a damsel tied to a tree with the dragon on guard, at which point Julian, I mean St George, leaps into the breach with his lance at the ready, slays the dragon, rescues the damsel - to lots of cheering, then all back to the mess hut for a cream tea! Rare Breeds Centre

Spring term means the school season is upon us...

As some of you may know, last year we piloted additional activities for our visiting schools, with the aim of making the RBC more attractive to educational visitors. Last year we had a promising start with over 1900 children participating in these activities and hope to build on those numbers this coming year.

This year we have tweaked our offering to ensure all activities are linked to the National Curriculum, take place in des-





ignated areas and are charged at £1 per child. Nurseries and pre-schools can take part in an Animal Faces craft activity and Schools have a choice of three Animal Talks (Classification and Adaptation, Lifecycles or Caring for Animals) or two Nature activities (Bug hunting or Pond life).



I have now planted our new schools pond, in the Nature Activity Area, with an array of pond plants including Marsh

Marigold, Water Mint, Yellow Loosestrife and Water Crowfoot. We are just waiting for the ground to dry out enough for us to install the dipping platform. Thanks go to Hitrade for kindly funding the pond project.



A new resource for schools this year is the Teacher's Information Pack which Maureen and I have produced. The pack is sent out to every booked school and details all the info schools need to know prior to a visit, this includes their itinerary, FAQs, map, health and safety summary, feedback forms and trail sheets.





Speaking of trail sheets I have produced a Farm Trail sheet with photos of animals and features that can be seen around the farm. This will be available to download from our website, sent to schools to photocopy and is available to buy from the Gift Shop.
